Crazies Hill Church of England Primary School has a Christian foundation and our vision and values are based on this.

Guided by our values of relationships, resilience and respect we provide a nurturing environment with academic excellence at its heart and develop caring, resilient members of society with strong values enabling them to thrive in modern British society.

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1.0 Introduction

Our collective worship policy strengthens and supports the Christian identity of our school, reaffirms our vision that a tree is known by its fruit; people by their actions and that our pupils are encouraged fulfil their true potential and be the best they can be. The children live out the vision through our values of *Relationships, Resilience and Respect* and the children have a deep understanding of their contribution to our school community.

Our worship reflects the variety of traditions found in the Church of England, and recognises and follows the Christian liturgical year. The daily Christian act of worship is central to our ethos and is supported by all staff and governors. It makes an important contribution to the overall spiritual, moral, social and cultural development of the whole school community. Our school strives for collective worship to be invitational, inspiring and inclusive to all faiths, to allow the spiritual development of everyone to flourish.

2.0 Aims and Objectives

Collective Worship gives pupils, staff and the school community the opportunity to:

- Engage with local Clergy and Churches
- Engage in an act of community
- Express praise and thanksgiving to God
- Be still and reflect
- Inspire children to think, question and reflect on their faith
- Explore the big questions of life and respond to national events
- Foster respect and deepen spiritual awareness
- Reflect on the character of God and on the teachings of Christ through Biblical texts
- Affirm Christian values and attitudes
- Awe and wonder moments for the children
- Visit different places of worship (Including other faiths)
- To instil Jesus' teaching of love, kindness and compassion
- Share each other's joys and challenges
- Celebrate special times in the Christian calendar

In line with the requirements of the requirements of the Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools (SIAMS) schedule, we aim to ensure that collective worship:

- Offers the opportunity, without compulsion, to all pupils and adults to grow spiritually through experiences of prayer, stillness, worship and reflection.
- Enables all pupils and adults to appreciate that Christians worship in different ways, for example using music, silence, story, prayer, reflection, the varied liturgical and other traditions and festivals of the Church of England.
- Helps pupils and adults to appreciate the relevance of faith in today's world, to encounter the teachings of Jesus and the Bible and to develop their understanding of the Christian belief in the trinitarian nature of God and its language.
- Enables pupils as well as adults to engage in the planning, leading and evaluation of collective worship in ways that lead to improving practice. Leaders of worship, have access to regular training and Diocesan advice.

- Encourages local church community partnerships to support the school effectively in developing its provision for collective worship.
- Teaches tolerance and respect for all faiths and beliefs, including those with no faith. This includes recognising the significance of other religious festivals to those within our school community.

3.0 Implementation

Collective worship is planned by a variety of stakeholders including staff, pupils, Clergy and external visitors in consultation with the collective worship leader. This act of worship can take place at any time of the school day and in any regular school grouping e.g. whole school or class. Our school plans systematically and cohesively using appropriate resources and approaches in line with the schools' vision and values.

This ensures that there is a shared understanding of the long- and short-term planning of worship and this enables continuity.

We are mindful of the variation in personal spiritual styles and provide a range of creative Worship, including: *e.g.: prayer partners, playing games, singing, prayer, story-telling, reflection, symbolism, drama, art etc*

Our worship consists of 4 elements:

- **Gather** – we welcome the community, for example, (with music, liturgy and the lighting of candles)
- **Engage** – we share, for example, (a Bible reading, followed by an activity to engage pupils with the Christian message)
- **Respond** – pupils, for example, (discuss, share, reflect, pray or sing)
- **Send** – we share, for example, (the message of the worship again and ask pupils to think about how they will affect their day / learning/ behaviour. We close with liturgy, final prayer, music and the extinguishing of our candles)

Pupils are given opportunities to lead worship throughout the year. Governors and other visitors are welcome to contribute to collective worship. They work with the collective worship leader and other staff to develop their own understanding of worship and to design a worship to support the spiritual development of one another.

4.0 Impact of Worship on our Children

- Children will make better life choices
- Pupils develop their own faith, spirituality or sense of self
- Children are mindful of themselves and others
- Pupils show respect and tolerance for all faiths and beliefs, including those with no faith
- Confidence to ask and challenge ideas
- Being grateful and enjoying life in all its fullness

5.0 Reviewing Worship

The governing body will keep up to date with the latest guidance from the Church of England and continually work with school staff, Clergy and the Diocese of Oxford to ensure the highest quality workshop is offered to children in the school. This may include attending Diocesan training, visiting the school to monitor/evaluate the effectiveness of worship and engaging with the school community.

6.0 Self-Assessment and Inspection

Our school regularly evaluates our acts of collective worship and the impact it has on the school and its wider community against our School vision and values. This involves monitoring by school leaders, staff, pupils and governors in order to grow and develop. We also welcome ideas or suggestions from the school community. Outcomes of evaluations are shared amongst staff and discussed at Governing body meetings. Continual review plays an integral part in developing the spiritual growth of the school. Worship is independently inspected by law under Section 48 of the Education Act 2005 in consultation with the Diocese of Oxford (SIAMS).

7.0 Parental Withdrawal

Worship is regarded as special time which wholly reflects our ethos as a church school. It is an inclusive opportunity for those of all faiths and none. We respect the right of parents to withdraw their child/children from acts of collective worship. However, as collective worship is central to our ethos, we would appreciate the opportunity to discuss this decision with parents.
